# COMPETITION RULES

Classes 1 – 11; and 20 - 61 are open to all, except where stated otherwise. Entries in the Junior Section must show the date of birth of child – the Junior Section age limit is 14. If children between 4 –14 enter any of the other applicable classes, please include date of birth.

Entry fees for classes prior to 29th July are: adults £1, children 50p. Any entries received after this date will be: adults £1.50, children £1.

All Entry Forms, with appropriate fees, to be sent to **Ann Ferris, Fordings, Llancarfan, CF62 3AD, 01446 781350**, except on the 4/5th August when they should be taken to the Village Hall at the times specified.

**No Entry Forms will be accepted after 9.30am on Saturday, 5th August.**

Exhibits may be staged, and late entry forms may be taken to the village hall on Friday, 4th August, from 5pm to 8pm and on Saturday, 5th August, from 9.00am to 10.15am, when the hall must be vacated so that judging may commence.

Exhibitors' cards must be collected from the hall, before staging exhibit. Any late entrant on Friday evening or Saturday morning will be asked to wait for their cards to be prepared before staging their exhibits. Please bring completed entry form with you; otherwise you will have to complete the form before the cards can be issued – to ensure correct name and class numbers are used.

No exhibitor will be allowed to enter more than two exhibits in any class. No frame (with glass) Photographs may exhibited. Exhibits already in placed must not be moved – if you need more space please ask one of Steward to assist you. All exhibits are shown at owners' risk. The Decision of the Judges is final.

**RHS Banksian Medal and Cups will be present at 4.30pm.**

Prize money: First - £3. Second - £2. Third - £1.50.

All exhibits to be removed between 5pm and 6pm on Saturday, but not before this time, to enable the public to view at their leisure – the committee will not be responsible for any unclaimed exhibits. # CLASSES FOR 2023

## SECTION 1 - FLOWERS

- Class 1 A single rose judged for perfume
- Class 2 Roses - a vase of 3 blooms
- Class 3 A jam jar of annual flowers
- Class 4 A vase of mixed foliage
- Class 5 A vase of mixed flowers
- Class 6 Pot plant - foliage - pot no bigger than 8"/20 cm diameter
- Class 7 Pot plant - flowering - pot no bigger than 8"/20 cm diameter
- Class 8 A vase of herbs - one or more cultivars
- Class 9 A vase of Sweet Peas - 5 stems
- Class 10 Floating flower heads or leaves in a bowl no bigger than 8" diameter
- Class 11 A perfect but lonely flower (not a rose) in a vase

## SECTION 2 - FLOWER ARRANGEMENTS

### New Entrant

- Class 12 'Box of Delights' - An arrangement in a Box
- Class 13 'Plain & Simple' - An arrangement with no more than five flowers
- Class 14 'Tea for One' - An arrangement measuring no more than 25cms (10") in any direction, including teacup and saucer

### Open to All

- Class 15 'Garden Treasures' - An all foliage arrangement
- Class 16 'Culinary Creations' - An arrangement to include anything from the kitchen or cooking.
- Class 17 'Royal Celebration' - A table arrangement suitable for a Royal occasion.
- Class 18 'Small is Beautiful' - An arrangement no exceeding 10cms (4") in height, width and depth.
- Class 19 'Weird & Wonderful' - An imaginative use of plant material with or without accessories.

## SECTION 3 - FRUIT AND VEGETABLES

- Class 20 Soft fruits - 10 fruits of any one variety ( e.g. raspberries, blackcurrants)
- Class 21 Any other fruit - 5 pieces ( e.g. figs, apples)
- Class 22 5 potatoes
- Class 23 6 Runner Beans
- Class 24 3 carrots - trimmed
- Class 25 Selection of 3 different vegetables (2 of each)
- Class 26 6 tomatoes (not cherry varieties)
- Class 27 6 cherry tomatoes
- Class 28 Mixed salad leaves growing in a pot no bigger than 9"/23cm dia
- Class 29 3 courgettes - 4" to 6"/ 10 to 15 cm in length
- Class 30 5 onions
- Class 31 3 beetroot



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- Class 32 Disaster vegetable - the one that went wrong!
- Class 33 Longest Runner Bean
- Class 34 Heaviest 3 home grown potatoes - cleaned and weighed together

#### SECTION 4 - HOME BAKING, PRESERVES AND BEVERAGES

- Class 35 5 savoury scones
- Class 36 1 Cornish pasty

#### Ingredients for the cake:

150ml sunflower oil, plus extra for the tin; 175g self-raising flour; 2 tbsp cocoa powder; 1 tsp bicarbonate of soda; 150g caster sugar; 2 tbsp golden syrup; 2 large eggs, lightly beaten; 150ml semi-skimmed milk

#### Ingredients for the icing:

100g unsalted butter; 225g icing sugar; 40g cocoa powder; 2½ tbsp milk (a little more if needed)

#### Method:

Heat the oven to 180C/160C fan/gas 4. Oil and line the base of two 18cm sandwich tins. Sieve the flour, cocoa powder and bicarbonate of soda into a bowl. Add the caster sugar and mix well. Make a well in the centre and add the golden syrup, eggs, sunflower oil and milk. Beat well with an electric whisk until smooth. Pour the mixture into the two tins and bake for 25-30 mins until risen and firm to the touch. Remove from oven, leave to cool for 10 mins before turning out onto a cooling rack. To make the icing, beat the unsalted butter in a bowl until soft. Gradually sieve and beat in the icing sugar and cocoa powder, then add enough of the milk to make the icing fluffy and spreadable. Sandwich the two cakes together with the butter icing and cover the sides and the top of the cake with more icing.

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# HELPFUL HINTS

Always read carefully the description of the class you are entering.

To ensure that your items, plates, vases, etc. can be identified please put your name on the underside of the item – it must not be visible. Signatures on paintings must be covered. No china etc from the hall may be used, so all containers must be brought with you. Please use the correct size of holder for the exhibit, i.e. do not place small tomatoes on a 10" cardboard plate.

Conformity of size and shape for vegetables is better than different sizes. Tomatoes should be picked carefully at the knuckle. Carrots and beetroot should have approximately 2" of stalk left on and they may be bound with raffia.

All items may be displayed on appropriately sized plates or black paper/cloth. The use of rings to balance fruit and vegetables is permitted. The only flowers or foliage which may be purchased are those used in the Flower Arranging classes 11 - 17. No artificial flowers.

ALL items in Section 1 and 3 must be from your own garden, or have been owned by you for at least 3 months.

Classes 42 - 46 – jams etc ensure that the jar is correctly sealed, either by using a new twist top or a wax seal with cellophane cover; the filling should be up to the neck of the jar. Chutney needs at least 2 months to mature; should have a metal twist lid. Plain jars and lids only to be used – any bearing name are not recommended. Old lids do not always have a good seal. Victoria sandwich should have a filling of raspberry jam with a light dusting of caster sugar. The top of the cake should not be placed on the cooling rack. Welsh Cake should be cut with a round 2-2.½" dia. and should be ¼" thick. Apple Tart should be cooked on a plate and have sufficient apple for the amount of pastry.

Flower arrangement – note the comment for each class as the interpretation of the title is as important as the construction of the arrangement. If using flowers of the same colour you need a variety of shapes and textures, i.e. roses, daisies, etc. Remember that the container is part of the arrangement and should be reflected in the colour of flowers/foilage; black is neutral.

Photographs may be placed on a card mount slightly larger than the print – but no frames with glass are permitted – as these can be broken and cause a health and safety hazard.

If you wish to enter an item which you did not make or own it must be entered in the name of the owner or maker. (i.e. an item made by your mother or father, etc.)
